Blackwell BOMBERS FOR BRITAIN Inglewood, Calif.

NOTE THIS IS NEWSREEL FILM. Start of "Fly-away Delivery" of part of many bombers being built for British Air Force.

Santa Monica, Calif. -- With cirplens production for America's needs rapidly accelerating, large-scale flyeway deliveries of fighting craft for Great Britain, and Morwegian military units training in Canada, began today at the plants of Douglas Aircraft Company.

While powerful attack-bombers for United States Army Air Corps, and swift dive-bombers for the Hevy and Marine Corps were relling off Douglas production lines in ever increasing numbers, the first group of new DB-7A bombers today was poised at Los Angeles Municipal Airport ready to leave tomorrow for New York, there to be delivered to representatives of England.

At the same time another consignment of 84-5 attack ships reared off for Toronto, where Royal Moreegian military units are taking delivery on ansorder for 36 originally placed by the government of Norway.

Neither the exact route nor the time of arrival at destination was made public for

either flight. Last week the United States Army Air Corps announced it had received the first of the formidable new Douglas A-20A attack-bombers, for which it has placed large orders. Personally heading the delivery flights of Norwegian airplanes is Major Victor E. Bertrandies. Dougles vice president in charge of export sales, who fought overseas during the first World War as a member of the famed "Lafayette Escadrille". Commander of the bomber flight to the East is O.W. ("Bill") Cayle, formerly chief palot for the western division of TME, and now head of export flight tests for Douglas. For a time previous to the collapse of French resistance, Coyle was in charge of a contingent of Douglas men stationed in French Morocco to assemble and service sirplames shipped from Southern California, other Douglas pilots at the controls of ships leaving today and tomorrow include: Lee Bishop, Edwin Ross, A.J. Viccellio, John Martin and Jimmy Haizlip, femous racing flier. Douglas officials disclosed that substantial numbers of additional airplanes of DB-7 and 8-A types are now undergoing final tests, and being prepared for delivery, and they did not deny that the Douglas Company's British and Morwegian orders would run into hundreds of sirplenes. These officials pointed out, however, that the major portion of production under the Company's record \$350,000,000 backing is for the government of the United States.

Please find enclosed 52 metres of developed negative on the events of the first few days of the declaration of war in Greece.

You will also find a letter meant for Mr Cummins, which please send on to him by air mail.

The subject matter of the shots is as follows.:
