## SOVIET PACT ACTUAL SIGNING IN MOSCOW !

Within the centuries-old walls of the Kremlin, in the office of Foreign Commissar Molotov, western civilization cut itself free from the bonds of prejudice. The representatives of Great Britain and Soviet Russia, headed by M. Molotov, Joseph Stalin and Sir Stafford Cripps, the British Ambassador, signed the pact which makes the two countries allies. The chief of the British Military Mission, General Mason Macfarlane, his Airforce and naval colleagues, together with Embassy attaches and Mr. Laurence Cadbury, were welcomed by the far-seeing head of the Soviet Government, M. Stalin.

Foreign Commissar Molotov signed the agreement pledging the two countries to help each other against Hitlerite Germany, and undertaking that neither shall negotiate or conclude an armistice, except by mutual consent.

Sir Stafford Cripps, signing for Britain, saw his patient diplomatic labours bear fruit in the reconciliation of two countries so long mistrustful of each other.

This pact seals Hitler's doom. It ensures that between two fronts

Nazi Germany will be crushed. The whole free world owes a great deal to Winston

Churchill, for sending to Moscow so astute a negotiator as Sir Stafford Cripps.

The banner of freedom is unassailably held high in the strong hands of Great

Britain and the Soviet.
