

Kent Visits Roosevelt at H. Crowd Hails Duke on Arr

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 23—

The Duke of Kent, youngest brother of King George VI, in the United States on a visit symbolical of Anglo-American friendship, was the guest of President and Mrs. Roosevelt at the temporary White House tonight.

The Duke's visit, coming so soon after the Executive's conferences at sea with Prime Minister Winston Churchill, generally was interpreted as another evidence of close Anglo-American cooperation, even though it was informal and not a State trip, as was the case when King George and Queen Elizabeth came to the United States shortly before the start of the war.

The Duke and his party arrived at the Roosevelt estate on the Hudson at 5:55 P. M. by automobile from New York, where the Duke landed at La Guardia Field after a flight from Canada, where he has been inspecting the Empire air training program for several weeks. The Duke did not appear shortly after his arrival at the President and Mrs. Roosevelt's home, what was described as a "casual" fashion. Tomorrow night will entertain the Duke simply, departing for the evening for a special Presidential
