These six rolls give a complete document of the crossing of the Garigliano River by the Brigade. This Bde. was on the extreme left flank of the 5th Army for the operation, the sea as it's left flank. Although of necessity not shot in continuity, this material is designed to fall in the following sequence. The 17th of January, 1944 is the eve of the launching of the first stage of the battle for Rome. Beside a signpost indicating the distance to that objective, a Private of the Brigade is leaning, smoking a cigarette, he throws it away and moves off. Armour moves up for the battle, and mobile 'Priest' guns and their crews prepare. Last minute adjustments and repairs are carried out on the guns, and the gunners eat their eve of battle meal. As the sun sets Infantry move up, silhouetted against the sunset. The darkness of the night that follows is abruptly broken by the criss-cross of tracer and gunfire, as the attack goes in, under cover of darkness. First light on the river sees casualties being carried up. On the narrow bridgehead on the other side the Infantry are held up by mines, and a Company of Sappers file onto a pontoon raft with detecting apparatus, cast off, and slowly cross the river under mortar fire. Meanwhile the Navy lends a hand. Lying off shore Destroyers give support fire to the Brigade, orders being transmitted by a Brigade Artillery Officer to sailors at Bde. H.Q., who retransmit the orders to the ships by wireless. Owing to the absolute lack of cover on either side of the river for seven miles, it being a flat coastal plain, considerable use is made of smoke screens to obscure our movements from the enemy. Through dense clouds of smoke, scout cars and Jeeps acting as Ambulances pass, and the Infantry press forward effectively, acts as a outrain to the first act of the Battle for Rome; the crossing of the Carigliano River.

(The Destroyers were too far out for anything this end; I suggest tie-up with shots in stock of naval broadsides).

While thick smoke rises from the villages of Minturno and Tufo from shell fire and bombs, the first batch of German prisoners are brought in, and via the tank raft wounded are brought across the river, alternating with medical supplies and field rations, (loaded here by Italians) going forward.

Meanwhile the Pontoon Bridge further down stream has been badly damaged by German mortar fire. Here Sappers are seen examining and reconstructing the bridge so that it can be used without delay as a jetty in conjunction with a light tank raft seen crossing in collapsible boats. A Bulldozer widens the approaches and an assortment of vehicles line the road waiting for dark to cross by the reconstructed Pontoon Bridge.

Early in the afternoon of the 17th January, 1944, the Canadians made a strong attack N.W. of Ortona, with the object of capturing the small town of Tollo on their left flank, and to gain important high ground overlooking the river Arielli. The infantry was well supported both by tanks and artillery. There was a constant barrage falling on the enemy positions from heavy mortar, and medium and heavy artillery. (25 pounders, 4,5" 5.5". Vickers heavy m/guns sprayed the enemy lines continuously on fixed lines and 4.2" mortars also kept up a strong barrage.



For the actual landing operations on the beach there was only one place allotted for the British Pool, so Barrow and I drew for it, I lost, so Major McCreary gave me the opportunity to fly on this special Air Support Mission, the object of which was to go in near the scene of the landing, proceed inland and bomb the town of Frosinone which is on Highway 6 between Cassino and Rome. The bombing was to smash up the highway through the town, thus bottling up all German military forces between Cassino and Frosinone, it also helped the landing forces in their drive inland to cut all communications between Frosinone and Rome. I did anticipate that I might see quite a lot of activity over the beaches but as you now know the landing went off very uneventfully with practically no opposition from the enemy. I flew with the 47th Bomb Group, 12th Air Support Command and there were 36 aircraft on the raid. Unfortunately there was a lot of haze and the sun was in the wrong place for good photography. Due to the speed of the raid on Frosinone it was not possible to secure more footage and evasive action threw me off the target momentarily. The mission was a tactical bombing and has assisted very materially in this particular landing.
