At 2300 hrs 7 Aug 44, the R.A.F. dropped tons of bombs in a hr from just south of CAEN TO FALAISE. At the same time our guns opened a barrage equal to any yet known.

The Infantry advanced ahead of the barrage, and at 2400 hrs the farmour started to move up to positions ahead of VAUCELLES where they had been stationed. All night/long the armour rolled down to their alloted positions. At tiles the roads where brilliantly lit by searchlights. In the morning, first prisoners started arriving. All seemed to be very young - 15 and 16 years of age.

#### ROCKET-FIRING TYPHOON.

C.B.S.14.

One of the most deadly air weapons supporting the Allied armies in the West is the rocket-firing typhoons. Their great accuracy, combined with their immense striking power, have made these aircraft one of of the most fearsome weapons to the enemy. They take all targets in their strade - gun emplacements, tanks, motor transport, troop concentrations, aerodrome buildings, and ammunition dumps. The Army can call upon them at the very shortest notice, and as soon as they get a summons they go in, let fly their eight rockets as they dive on the target, and quickly put paid to whatever they are attacking. In the great battle at present going on in the British and Canadian Sector the typhoons knocked out more than 88 tanks and right through the campaign their record has been of the highest order.

#### BOMBER COMMAND/ATTACKS ON COMMUNICATIONS

#### AND V-BOAT PENS.

On the 4th August, Bomber Command carried out an attack on a bridge near Etaples. It was learnt from Intelligence that the Germans were endeavouring to move troops from the Pas de Calais area. This bridge carries the main line linking the Pas de Calais with Normandy and therefore, its destruction was of paramount importance. The following day aircraft of Bomber Command went out to attack the U-boat pens at Brest as the American army were nearing that port. The aircraft carried the R.A.F.'s largest bombs to smash these pens. It was known that fifteen of the largest U-boats were being harboured in Brest and the bombs went right on to the pens and pierced them. Two of these bombs can be seen falling in the air-to-air shots of the Bombers flying through the flak.

The town was taken late last evening. I entered it early in the morning. Across the river Mayenne, bridge was built during the night, by the 1877th Engrs. Traffic was rolling across the bridge. Civilians started to return to town, About midday, crowds of civilians were returning knowneskkkaxkawa to town, the 18th latenty living was moving through the town and the people really went wild with cheering and waving.

Unexpectedly a crowd came streaming into the middle of the public square, dragging one of collaborationists along dressed in a swastike and a frame of the picturers of the Germans she was friendly with. The foot troop of the 18th late of the 315th Regt. passed through town and again were greeted with cheers.

#### THE OFFENSIVE AGAINST THE FLYING BOMB.

For many months, as Mr. Churchill said, the Bombers of the Royal Air Force have carried out continued battles against the flying bomb by bombing their launching sites, and it has been in no wow small measure due to this continuous offensive that the enemy's effort against this country has not been greater.

Mecently a fine spell of weather enabled Bomber Command to step-up the attack. Great fleets of four-engined bombers were sent out to smash the flying bomb sites and water storage depots. To ensure the maximum concentration of bombing, target indicators were dropped in the target area. Then the bombers went in and saturated the target with high explosives. Direct hits have been scored on many of the installations causing their complete destruction. In addition the concrete roads and railways leading to the launching sites and storage depots have been smashed. As Air Correspondents have pointed out, the bombing offensive against the flying bomb has definitely ment reduced the enemy's effort against this country.

An automatic 35mm camera installed in the R.A.F.'s newest fighter, the Tempest, records the "kill" of a flying bomb over Southern England. The R. 4.F. are destroying a large number of these bombs - either by shooting them down into the Channel or, on open country or by exploding them in mid air.

The "A" Co. of the Infantry come up a street and deploy along a wall over the river and shoot at the Germans who are in buildings on the opposite bank.

The fighting is not very active at/this time and a little later the troops are pretty much at ease and only fire occasionally.

Troops and takes going into Laval - post sign-post. Civilian giving wine to takk driver. Civilians tearing off German posters.

Armoured Division coming in.

Raising of flag on court-house by civilians at the time our front was about 200 yards beyond, across the main square of town. Re-take of equipment and men passing Laval sign-post. Two German prisoners being marched back out of town posts.
