The Bombay house of Mr. Jinnah, Indian Moslem leader,

At his house <sup>near</sup> Bombay, India's Moslem leader, Mr. Jinnah, received Mahatma Gandhi, in the hope of settling the long standing Muslim-Hindu disputes.
