Personnet presents an historic document, the actual surrender scene in Field Marshal Mentgemery's tent, where German delegates signed Unconditional Surrender. Afterwards the Field Marshal delivers a message to all, paying heartfelt tribute to the fallen and our Allies.

GERMANY LUNEBERG HEATH SOUTH OF HAMBURG.

SV.Monty and Gormans sit down at table and Menty talks: - "We assembled here today to accept the surrender terms which have been made with the delegation from the Gorman Army. I will now read out the terms of that instrument of surrender:-

"The German command agrees to the surrender of all German Armed Forces in Holland, in morthwest Germany including the Frisian Islands and Heligeland and all other Islands and Schleswigholstein and in Denmark to the C-inC, 21st. Army group. this to include all Naval ships in these areas. These forces to lay down their arms and to surrender unconditionally."

SCU Menty talking: - "Disobedience of orders of failure

SCU Monty talking: - "Disobedience of orders of failure to comply with them will be regarded as a breach of these surrender terms and will be dealt with by the Allied powers in accordance with the accepted laws and usages of war". "The dicision of the Allied powers will be final - if any doube or dispute arises as to the meaning or interpretation of these surrender terms".

That is the text of the instrument of surrender and the Germani delegation will now sign this paper and they will sign in order of semiority and Gen. Admiral Van Friedeberg will sign first". SV. Monty moves over and Friedeberg and Kiensl sign: "now - Gen. Kiensl will sign next. LV Wagner, Polleck and Frieder signing and Menty sits down and signs: - and now Admiral Wagner will sign next-Gen. Polleck will sign next-end Major Frieder will sign last. Now I will sign the instrument on behald of the Supreme Allied Commander, General Eisenhower". "Now that concluded the formal surrender and there are various matters new-details to be discussed which we will do in closed session".

SV. Monty outside Caravan speaks:-"On this day Victory in Europe I feel I would like to speak to all who have served and fought with me during the last few years - what I have to say is very simple and quite short- I would ask you all to remember those of our comrades who fell in the struggle. They gave their lives that others might have freedom and no man can do more than that. I believe that God would say to each one of the - "Well done, thou good and Faithful servant". SCU Monty outside Caravan speaks?-" In the early days of this war the British Empier stood alone against the combined might of the tris powers and during those days we suffered some great disasters but we stood firm on the defensive but striking blows where we could. Later we joined by Russian and American men and from then enwards the end was in no doubt". It has been a privilege and an nonour to command this great British Empier team in Western Europe. Few commanders have had such loyal service as you have given me. I thank each one of you from the bottom of my hear? and so let us embark on what lies ahead full of joy and optimism we have won the German War-let us now win the peace. Good luck to each one of you wherever you may be".
