The famous Hagenbeck Zoo near'Hamburg is again open wartime to the public. Through/food shortage the Zoo lost 22 lions MMM 200 monkeys and fifteen bears, but the animal family is still pretty large.

British tommies were much amused to see the Hagenbeck elephants clearing up bomb damage, central heating included. It's very nice for the termines to see other people doing the fatigues. The elephant has strength but fortunately no malice; otherwise he might say to the soldiers, Thee knocked it down, thee pick it up.

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Munich Barter Centre

In Munich one of the largest barter-centres of Germany is opened. It is a kind of a store in which you can buy nearly everything if you turn in goods of equal exchange value.

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Every object is assessed at prewar price. You get a receipt in Reichsmark for which you will later get the goods you want.

Eusiness in the clothing department is very brisk ... particularly in the shoe department. In three months 80.000 pairs of boots were bartered.

Often the choice is difficult ... some are most concerned with the quality, others are more interested in smart appearance.

Many a wish is granted here, many a need met ruling out frand and Black Market - until one day normal trade will again supplant the barter-centre.
