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BRITISH TROOPS AT CAMBODIAN WATER FESTIVAL. RONALD NOBLE.

at Phnom Penh the Exptail Capital of Cambodgia, Army, Air Force and Navy were invited to witness the Famous Water Festival which has been held annually for thousands of years.

The Festival is held in celebration of the tidal waters of the river being pushed back to the sea by the flood waters, (similar to the Severn Bore, I imagine). The significance being that the floods area almost over, the water recedes to the sea and the m crops one no longer in danger.

The young 24 year old kine, attends the festival, and, as one cance from each village passes the floating palace where the king lives, the village leader shouts his compliments or complaints to the King. The one day in the year when he can insult the King face to face - the only difficulty was that the King didn't listen or go close enough to hear so much so that it was impossible to get a shot of him and he cences at the same time.

After the chiefs have belly-ached the cances with their crews of forty carsmen so p river to the starting post, and then race down the river like mad in pairs, the race finishing just in front of the floating palace.

This goes on for three days, and the last day the king presents cups to the winning teams. Unfortunately the presentation takes place after dark withelmost no lighting. This applies also to the most interesting parts of the festival.

When the last day is over the Cambodgians return to their village happy in the knowledge that prosperity will arrive in the ensuing months and that all their complaints have had a fair hearing!

There is no set starting point, they all swing round in pairs and then race for the post.

Passing the winning post. Several shots.

One shot of the Judge sitting in one of the small markboats. He bests the drum as the first cence goes past the line.

Roll 3. English troops walking along road in front of Royal Felsce.

British walking through Cambodian Guard of honour and down steps into floating palace.

Floating palace, g.v.

Cambodian erowd watching from banks.

Priviledged apportators under awning.

General Allessandrie and Brigadier Woodfood arrive.

Shot of all British sitting by water's edge, on their British in foreground and canoos passing in background young king of Cambodia with British and French General on either side.

One long shot taken in evening of the race finishing in the distance and spectators in the foregro nd,

Most taken in sunlight, but lest roll in flat light.
