MALAYAN VILLAGESMOVE DOWNSTREAM ON 93 RAFTS Exodus unique in Malaya - perhaps anywhere else for that matter - was undertaken by 350 villagers bordering the River Lebir. They dismantled their jungle-

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houses while the Headman and the District Officer fixed on a new site for the uprooted campongs. They, with the houses hulls reassembled on 93 rafts, the strange procession began a six-day journey downstream - to safety. They'd been living a nightmare existence in the hearts of bandit-country, and the only choice seemed to be to get out while they could. RAF fighters patrolled the river, on the lookout for Reds who might attack the convoy. A mile of rapids proved a all the rafts greater danger, but/many got by without mishap.
