This will be the first time for 16 years that the service has been held at St. Paul's. Normally it takes place at Westminster Abbry, but in Coronation years when the Abbey is closed it is transferred to the Cathedral, where King George VI distributed the Maundy in 1937. At this service, which dates back to the days when Sovereigns washed the feet of the poor in commemoration of Christ's washing of the Apostles' feet. "as many old men and as many old women as the Sovereign has years of age "receive gifts of money in lieu of the ancient gifts of food and clothing. They also get as many pence as the Sovereign has years of age in the specially minted silver Maundy pieces — silver pence, twopences, threepences and groats.

The Queen's birthday is on April 21, when she will be 27, so this year there will be 27 men and 27 women recipients, each receiving 2s. 4d. in the silver pence.

EACH RECEIVED ALSO A WHITE PURSE CONTAINING THE SPECIAL SILVER MAUNDY PENNIES, TUPPENCES, THREEPENCES, AND FOURPENCES, AS MANY PENCE AS THE QUEEN IS YEARS OF AGE.

TOWARDS THE END THERE WAS A PRAYER, THE OPENING WORDS OF WHICH RAN: "WE THANK THEE, OH LORD, AND PRAISE THY NAME, THAT THOU HAST NOT ONLY BESTOWED GREATNESS AND MAJESTY UPON OUR SOVEREIGN LADY, QUEEN ELIZABETH, BUT HAST GIVEN HER A HEART ALSO TO SHOW MERCY TO THE POOR AND NEEDY."
