THE ENGIAND - NEW ZEALAND AIR RACE

Work is already in hand at London Airport in preparation for the start of the London - New Zealand Air Race on Thursday, 8th October. For this event, the Public Enclosure is being transferred to the new Central Terminal Area, and members of the public who visit the Airport to view the competing aircraft on the three view days (5th - 7th October) or on the start day will gain access to the re-sited Enclosure through the newly-built half-mile tunnel. The Enclosure will close for the winter on Sunday, 11th October.

Following the withdrawal of the North American B45 Tornado from the Speed Section and the Custer Channel Wing Corporation's CCW5 from the Transport Handicap Section, the list of entries now stands at nine in the Speed Section and five in the Transport Handicap Section. A slight alteration has been made in the starting times; the Transport Handicap Section will be started between 4.30 p.m. and 5.00 p.m. and the Speed Section between 5.30 p.m. and 6.00 p.m.

Chief Pilot: W/Cdr. Lewis M. HODGES, DSO and bar, DFC and bar.

B. 1/3/1918. Entered RAF College, Cranwell, 1937. Flew Hampdens early in War; shot down over France, 1940, evaded fapture, and rejoined his squadron (No. 49). DFC, 1942. In 1943 appointed to command No. 161 (Special Duties) Squadron, responsible for parachuting agents into occupied countries. Awarded DSO and bar to DFC for work with this squadron. Staff College, 1944. In November, 1944, appointed to command No. 357 (Special Buties) Squadron in Far East, flying Liberators over Burma, Siam, French Indo-China and Malaya. Bar to DSO, 1945. Since War has served at Air Ministry as Staff Officer to Deputy Chief of the Air Staff, and at Ministry of Defence. Recently completed course at RAF Flying College.

Navigator: S/Idr. Robert CURRIE, AFC. b. 4/11/20. Joined RAF, 1939, and completed three operational tours. Since War has undertaken navigation training duties and has recently been senior navigation officer at several bomber stations.

Pilot in King's Flight, RAF, from August, 1946, to Dec. 1948, and piloted Viking during the Royal Tour of South Africa. MVO, 1949. Empire Flying School, Hullavington, 1949, later on staff of RAF Flying School, Manby. Played cricket for RAF, 1946-49.

Is the only pilot in the Race who also flew in the MacRobertson race to Australia in 1934. (Lockheed Vaga, with D.C.T. Bennett as navigator, retiring at Aleppo).

KIM ROYAL DUTCH AIRLINES. Douglas DC-6A, PH-TGA Racing No. 21

Captain: Captain Henry A.A. KOOPER. b. 1907, Amsterdam. Learnt to fly, 1927. Joined KIM, 1930, and flew Amsterdam - Far East route. Promoted to First-class Captain, 1946. Made proving flights between Netherlands and Indonesia, via Mauritius, in 1949. Has also flown on North Atlantic and other routes, and has 18,500 flying hours.
