C BESTAL PALACE.

Thirty entries for the International Trophy Race --- the first international on the Crystal Palace track. Twenty-five laps of two miles each --- and the drivers included Bira, Austin Dobson, Lurani, Goodacre and Nakh. Throbbing engines and screaming tyres shattered the afternoon ear, as all the skill of famous speedmen flung the little cars round snakey twists and corners. The race at the finish resolved itself into a duel between the Siamese Prince Bira and Austin Dobson. Bira No. 24 and Dobson No. 9 went after the trophy with all they had, till Bira won by half a length. SHANGHAI.

First pictures of open warfare in China reach us from Tangkwantum --- twenty-two miles north of Shanghai on the Yangtse River. Rains are now flooding the typical Chinese country, impeding *Mightly* the Japanese advance with men, Machinez guns and artillery. But despite the difficulties of waterlogged fields to hamper transport and lower morale, the Mikado's men push on; interfing their way to the stronghold of Tangkwantun --- one more stage in their advance. The peaceful scene of a willow-pattern plate has become an objective in war --- Tangkwantun falls to the invader. At Shanghai itself warships on the Wangpoo River are firing aalvo after salvo upon the Chinese positions. Seferming shedts hurtle through the sky to reduce a city to smooldering mockage ---or singulator and mangle the men defending. Japanese troops pressing forward here to maintain the sale of gained for them by the high big gune, have camouflaged themselves against aerial

observers --- and as they gain fresh vantage points, the voice of the guns is heard anew '
