Fourteen starters --- and they're off to a good one --- most of the field got well away. Now watch them all come thundering on as we slow down the camera --- on the right Rockfell the favourite is getting ready to assume the lead

Now follow them round from our position on top of the tower.

On the rails and the second sleeves and quartered cap. Next to Rockfel with tockey in black with hooped sleeves --- Rattoo has second place going to Tattenham Corner. Now Croix de Feu and Stafarella on the outside are challenging Rattoo for second place.

All these fillies look dangerous and the corner, but once round there Harry Wragg let Rockfel go.
