WELCOME BOLDNESS IN ALLEID STRATEGY.

leaders he's all in favour of offensive action, but he's not
giving away any secret information to the microphone.

We gland back at the meeting of Churchill and Roosevelt in mid-Atlantic: the agreement they reached then is still effective: Britain and America know that Madagascar must be kept out of Axis hands to protect our sea route the Cape: it's a grand thing to be getting the habit of getting in first
