This was the last stage of the Battle of Egypt which had become the Battle of Libya: this was the day when the Eighth Army was at Wadi Zem Zem, pressing on to Homs and Tarhuna; names less familiar than Tobruk and Benghazi and Derna --- because we had never before trodden this ground so close to Tripoli; this was the day when General Montgomery told his men --- "The Eighth Army is going to Tripoli. Nothing can stop us now."
