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THE FAR EAST FRONT --- NEW GUINEA AND TIMOR.

We have received by way of Australia another news-film record of the war in the Far East --- the war of jungle and swamp and heat and flies; and pictures of the kind of life that is hard enough to live without fighting a highly-trained nation into the bargein. It tells of hazardous journeys through the wildest country to reconnoitre Japanese dispositions: the camera tells its vivid story from the other side of the world of a primitive kind of war --- aided and made more terrible by modern weapons; machine guns, automatic rifles and radio!

A wireless transmitting station was set up here to pass formation back to jungle headquarters and the lonely trek proceeded.

And here, another lonely outpost provides evidence of 1943

war: destruction of Japanese bombers --- this one the first shot
