First stop on their 40 mile road—journey was at Pontypridd, where they met the Chairman of the Town Council, and leaders of the civic, legal, and industrial life of the town.

Here, at the foot of the Rhondda- one of the most famous valleys. the symbolic home of the Welsh Miner- Wales took the Queen to its heart. It was more than a passing cheer to Royalty driving through, it was a welcome to the hearth and home. For the visit of the Queen and the Duke brought renewed confidence in the future, to hard-working men of the pits

Before leaving, Her Majesty received a charming floral tribute from little Jillean Alexander.
