Back to America - where stresses encountered by pilots, (when baling out at supersonic speeds) the subject of new tests.

That was a dummy pilot, by the way, mounted on a rocket-sled - and now speeding at over seven hundred miles per hour.

Filmed by ultra-slow-motion cameras, the dummy is ejected, while delecate instruments record the terrific fauxeexx forces encountered - for air-safety research
