

The Cathedral Church of Glasgow was the centre of a colourful ceremony when the Duke of Gloucester- as Colonel of the Scots Guards, unveiled a memorial window to the ~~Battalion~~ Regiment.

The window is dedicated to the memory of all Scots Guardsmen who gave their lives for their country, since the Regiment was formed 314 years ago

The Duke, then, made an inspection of the 1st Battalion, whose Colours, (which were presented ~~after the Coronation by King George VI in the garden of Buckingham Palace~~ <sup>by KING GEORGE VI AFTER HIS CORONATION -</sup>) had been laid up for safe keeping.

Also taking part in the parade were members of the Old Comrades Association- a stalwart company, who had brought honour and glory to every battlefield in which the Regiment had played <sup>its</sup> noble part. Scotland salutes them with affection and gratitude.

Another Royal occasion in Glasgow, when Princess Alexandra (escorted by the Lord Provost) ~~left~~ left the City Chambers to take the salute at a Rally of the Scottish Girls' Training Corps, of which she is Patron.

Passing in review were girls enrolled under the "further education" scheme of the Ministry of Education, ~~the~~ the members are trained to become good citizens, to take an interest in sport, and <sup>in</sup> domestic activities.
