

Lancashire: The workshop background to a record achievement on Coniston Water as Speed King Donald Campbell takes over his jet-craft "Bluebird" from a skilled team of machanics - tuned and ready for a world-shattering performance:

Yes, Bluebird was ready, and excited crowds watched the preparations for, what was originally planned, as a trial run. A scientific build-up before Campbelliattempted to raise his own world water speed-record of 216 mph -

set up in Nevada - last year.

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Now, with a jet scream, Bluebird speeds into that measured kilometre on the first run.

The conditions were not good, while the heat-haze (causing poor visibility) made it difficult to film the speed-rocked craft.

And no wonder as the time-post announces the incredible speed.

It was 286 miles per hour - over twice as fast as the world record by Donald's father, Sir Malcolm, in 1939.

Yet, it was the slower return run that nearly brought tragedy.

Choked by fumes that nearly caused him to black-out - Donald travelled at 164 miles per hour.

The terrifying ordeal was arrank over. The young speed-ace heard that his two-run average was a new world record of 225.6 miles per hour - his third new record in fifteen months.

Well done, Donald. Sir Malcolm would be proud of you!
