In Tanganyika, the homage of loyal African people continued, when Princess Margaret looked at a fascinating array of gifts, presented by proud chiefteins on behalf of their tribes. This was the generous welcome to Mwanza, and a "baraza" that brought to the Royal Guest - a glimpse of Africa's primitive past. Among a revival of half-forgotten tribal dances was a parade of Amalia Doctors, carrying eighteen-foot pythons, cobres, or the deadly green mambas. There were the Bungunguli porcupine hunters . They now keep them as domestic pets, with beboons and hyenas. Here, the tribel leader plays extunical box-like clogsof the dancers drum out a message of welcome \_SOUND. noted During the parade, the Princess gratted a further token of loyalty a picture, (worked in a robe) at the Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh Royal appreciation to mark a colourful pageant of tribal history. Next day, Her Royal Highness drove to Arushs - to attend a gathering of primitive Masai tribesmen. presented states Berest was Mr Francis Townsend, the District Commissioner for Massiland

During her stay, the Princess visited the farm of Mr Kuenzler, a big-game hunter. There, she fed the gifaffes, and selected a pair of zebras - a present from the Government of Tanganyika.
