

Included in the list of Birthday Honours issued from
Buckingham Palace is the name of Mr J. Arthur Rank, whom the
Queen has been pleased to honour with elevation to the peerage.
His barony is for public services --- and the field in which he has
figured chiefly in the public eye has, of course, been the kinking
cinema, which, through the yearsm has been so constantly active
in the cause of charities. One notable presentation recently
made to Mr Rank was the Film Academy Award for the Production of
children's films --- an aspect of the cinema which is all-important
in terms of the welfare of youth.

The recent opening of the new flour mills at Southampton reminds us to of the other side of the Rank activities --- the production of the nation's bread. On the occasion of a visit to meanfather another great mill --- at Leith, in Scotland --- Mr Rank presented Prince Philip with a replicant of a windmill as a memento.

But it is in connection with a film organisation employing over thirty-two thousand men and women that the name of J. Arthur Rank has achieved world-wide recognition; carrying the name of Britain to the farthest corners of the earth through the medium of British films.
