## Mr. Wilkinson meets the Queen

Working in his garden (now that the brighter days are here) Mr. Wilkinson has a wonderful memory of Easter 1958. Living on their joint Old age pensions of £4 per week, with 19/-National Assistance - the Wilkinsons have to keep to a very careful budget. And if a life of toil has brought them scant reward - well they seldom complain. (BRING UP). During our visit, we asked Mr. Wilkinson what sort of entertainment do you both enjoy now ? (BRING UP) SOUND. Before leaving home to do some shopping, Mr. Wilkinson told us that he plans to divide his set of 32 Silver Maundy pennies between his five grand-children. Incidentally, the Maundy honey ceremony so intrigued Mr. Wilkinson that he visited his public library to trace its origin. So when he joined Mrs. Wilkinson to carry home the shopping - this is what he told her would happen on the great day. (BRIIG WP). "We shall be going in a car to the Abbey. We mustn't be late, my dear .. You know, this distribution of Royal Maundy goes back to the 12th century - almost to William the Conqueror ... It began with the distribution of alms and at one time the Sovereign washed the old people's feet as a sign of humility. I shall be one of 32 men and 32 women to receive the Silver Coins. (BLLIG-UP). The Queen will come with Prince Philip. It was the Queen's grandfather, King George V who revived this Maundy ceremony; (BRING UP). The Queen and the Duke carry nosegays of sweet herbs - just as the sovereign did years ago to protect him against the plague.
