During recent months, there have been border clashes between Aden ~~tribes~~ and Yemeni tribesmen.

It's a dangerous job, too, ~~and~~ <sup>and</sup> the men of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry are making constant patrols.

In this mountain observation post, the Emir of Dhala, a local ruler, looks over ~~the terrain where many saboteurs are hidden.~~ <sup>country which hides many saboteurs.</sup>

~~In~~ the Shropshire Light Infantry ~~is~~ supported the Buffs and Aden ~~tribesmen when they relieved~~ Fort Assarir, where ~~the~~ <sup>British Colonial Office official, Mr Somerset,</sup> ~~Somerset~~ and a tiny force were besieged for eight days.

Many observers believe that more serious clashes are to come. In recent months, Yemen has received ~~large quantities of~~ Soviet tanks, jet ~~fighter~~ fighters and guns; ~~in addition,~~ Egyptian officers are training there, too.
