If they can't have it that way, then its overtime for extra duties or work to rule. They'll still be acting as guides answering countless questions posing with the ravens - their rivals for popularity with camera-happy tourists. They'll still be acting as guides.

Outside the Tower, the Garter ceremony at St. George's Windsor would lose alot of its glitter without the Beefeaters.

So far they're not satisfied with the War Office's offers of extra pay. One month to pay-up or put up without them is the ultimatum - after that it'll be routine only.....

But whichever way the wind blows in the Tower controversy, they'll still be making mud pies with the kids on Tower beach next summer. And there'll still be Beefeaters on guard, adding to the fascination of a visit to the Tower of London
