BAY OF BISCAY BATTLE.

H.M.S. ENTERPRISE, one of the two British Cruisers which sank three German destroyers out of a force of eleven. Plugged shell-splinter holes; evidence of the engagement which saw the routing of an immensely superior enemy force, and the sinking of a German blockede-runner by Allied aircraft. Sharing the battle honours is H.M.S. GLASGOW. Partner in a stery which sent a thrill through the entire nation. Among her battle scars, GLASGOW wears a jagged hale where a shell penetrated her flag deck.

Captain Clark of the Glasgow received the personal congratulations of the First Lord of the Admiralty, and a friendly visit by Captain Grant of the ENTERPRISE.

Glasgew's wounded are brought ashere. Men who fought one of the most manny unequal but most successful engagements of the war. Outnumbered by six to one, the two cruisers routed almost the entire German destroyer force in the Bay of Biscay.
