THE EMPIRE'S DECLARATION.

The statement signed by the Prime Ministers of the British Commenwealth outlines the results of their series of Conferences. Signatures are appended to a declaration which reveres our past, discloses a solid unity in our present and holds out infinite provise and faith for the future. The statement brings a pledge to the oppressed that 'not one shall be abandened": it underlines the singleness of purpose to end the ageny which besets manking; it points the way to that new world of concerd and understanding for which use have for so long striven, but without lasting effect. It was generally agreed that the Commonwealth Prime Ministers should met tegether more frequently. That in itself would point to the day when the example of Empire brotherhood will "become", as Mr. Mackensie King vigualises, 'a model for the whole world". This strong and living partnership may give the lead toward that great age when man shall rise up out of darkness and live in light. The Empire's Declaration is an instrument to that ende
