THE ADVANCE ON MANDALAY

Timed to synchronise with the British encirclement of Mandalay, men of the Thirty-Righth Chinese Division add artillery weight to the Southward drive. Given the tools these troops demonstrate that they know how to use 'em. Glose Air co-operation comes from American dive bumbers.

King pin of the Japanese hold on Burma was Mandalay, the old capital of the country. Pive hundred miles of hard fighting across Burma brought the British Fourteenth within gui-range of the city.

The Japanese made use of ancient pagedas and temples as strong points. Resistance was determined, and made the capture of Handalay the costlicat campaign of the whole Burma war.

The Second British Division and the famous Indian 19th "Bagger" Division were first into Mandalay. Taking a look at the town is their commander, General Rees who lived in Mandalay fifteen years ago as the Governor's Semretary. Only handfuls of Japanese prisoners are brought in, a change from the masses of captured Germans now so familiar in newsreels.
