THE LAM'S VICTORY

It was in Rangeon, that men of the lath celebrate with a victory march their hard-fought triumph over the Japa.

Lord Louis Mountbatten, Supreme Allied Germander in South East Asia took the salute. Once the Forgetten Army, the 14th has written its name large in the history of Burna. The Monseon rain, the old enemy of these jungle compaigners, couldn't even leave their victory parade alone.

Famous regiments of fighters from many nations were among the thousands of troops who took part in the march past. West Africans, Indians, Churkas proudly paraded alongside British Marines and the men of County battaliens. To round off the 14th's triumph, it's Commander General Sir William Slim (filmed at Pathe's Studies) has this to say on the war situation.

GENERAL SLIM

"Our American Allies in the Pacific have won great victories; we have had our own successes in the liberation of the greater part of Bulma; but the Japanese is a tough enemy and much must be done before he will admit defeat. Nothing can step us winning, but a great deal can be done to speed up and render less coutly the final victory. That depends on hew soon and to what extent we can marshal against Japan the resources which now become available."
