MOTOR PACED CYCLING

Fishing-red handlebars and sit-up-and-beg seating bring novelty back to British cycling. Pushing off in the ten mile Motor paced challenge match are the Marlboro club's ace paddler, Scott (in quartered shirt) and London rider Waters. First test comes as riders link up with their pacing motor bikes. Square-shirted Scott picks up well and goes away in front. Waters, on the inside misses out - and for the first spell of the 10-mile course he's way behind.

Sign of a skilful rider, as Waters sticks closer than a brother. Masterly judgement keeps his front tyre close to the motor bike roller, cutting wind resistance. Pacing the Home Hill course, spectators voted the motor paced challenge the event of the day.

It's in the bag now and Waters wins. He gets the cheers and (with the motor cyclist dropping out of the picture) all he wants now is somebody to mind his bike.

TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

Top-line Tennis reappears on the sports pages in the British hard-court championship finals at Bournemouth. Nearest the camera is Britain's white hope, 22 year old Derek Barton up against veteran Australian ace Jack Harper. An uneasy cleverness at retrieving difficult balls puts the Australian on top in a straight sets victory. Harper's win sets back Barton's Davis Cup chances.

Harper's still getting them back - and a last over-the-net lob gives him game, set and match. A budding Davis Cup selection Committee sizes up from among the new faces in British tennis, but their best thrill comes from title-holder Mrs Hensies (nearest the camera and better known as Kay Stammers) and 23 year old challenger Jean Nicoll - now Mrs. Bostock.

Last point, and its game, set and match to Mrs. Bostock, with a 6-3, 6-4 win. Hard Courts Queen at 23, the tennis world opens up to Mrs. Jean Bostock.
