Surprise success of Peron's new diplomacy was to find favour with Generalissimo Stalin.

In the castle-chapel at Stockholm the Swedish Royal family gather for the christening ceremony of their new baby, Karl Gustav, hereditary prince of Sweden. A spectacle memorable for its regal magnificence.
