"In any great emergency or crusade the common people usually are a mile out in front of their Governments. They proved it again, in their eagerness - ammounced in every medium of public expression open to them - to make personal sagrifices to aid the distressed populations of Europe and Asia, while those officially charged with bringing relief to the three million refugees and displaced persons in Europe alone, were still debating and passing resolutions on the relative merits of various means suggested to bring about that relief.
