Outside in the streets of Nuremberg, the ene-time capital city of Nazism hears and reads a new message. Tyronny is gene, and fear and war. They read - but do they learn?

Until the sentences are carried out, guards patrol the town. There must be no last minute rescues and no playing up the legand of the Masi martyrs.

In this triumph of fastice, a word of public thanks to the British team of presecutors. Among them Attorney General Sir Hartley Shawcross and Sir David Maxwell Pyfe. It is the end at Murembers.

Beside the seaside this week are 300 Tory delegates. Their aim - to put Labour out of office. Back from a Nuremberg Vistory, Lawyer Sir David Maxwell Tyre shares the campaign planning with Celenel Oliver Stanley. Becisions - no alliance with the Liberals - no Change of the Party name. In the spetlight was Mr. Anthony Eden, possible successor to Winston Churchill. Presiding was the new Conservative Chairman, Lord Woolton, Commander-in-Chief in the coming battle for votes.

Now watch science stick a finger in the sportsmen's pie. A dirt track - a bike - and recket propulsion. Amounted as a potential new speed maker, the recket-bike gets a test from Wembley Skipper Bill Kitchen. Result, sparks and spectacle - but no more speed.

First pictures from our cameramen in Athens. A nation waits the return of its King. From a destroyer in Phalorem Bay, a notor launch carries George II, King of the Hellemes back to his throne. Ashere, His Majesty is welcomed by officials and Cabinet Ministers of the Isaldaris Government.

With the King, were the Green Prince Paul, and Princess Prederica. So begins a new Chapter in Greek History. The only living monarch to eccupy the same throne three times, fate has dealt kindly with George of the

Hellenes. Other Kings of Hastern Europe are in exile. Except for George of Greece, only Michael of Russian remains, and he is under Russian orders.

For royal supporters of the returning exile, this is a day of reward for their years of fith. At Athens Cathedral, ex-Regent Archbishop Demantines conducts a thenkesiving service.
