But to this hide-out came his henchmen. Clubfooted Josef Goebbels, the Voice of Nazism, later a suicide.

Foreign boss Von Ribbentrop, hanged at Nuremberg.

On right here - Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler, also a suicide.

Here too lived one woman - Eva Braun, reportedly Hitler's wife.

This was to be the ex-Austrian corporal's victory dance. Many Germans hope they are still alive. The Allies believe them dead. These pictures show how they lived.
