Cairo Grand Prix

At Gezira, Cairo, King Farouk is there for the start of Egypt's Grand Prix. 16 drivers are off on the 50 lap journey - a distance of 45 miles. All the cars are Italian built 1,100 litre Cisitalia. With Brooklands closed and British car racing in the doldrums, ex-enemy Italy makes a bid to lead the world.

Soon after the start Italy's Ceitese, no. 5 takes the lead followed by Pagani No. 18.

Ceitese increases his lead in each lap and keeps it till the end. He comes in a winner, clocking 45 minutes 49.2 seconds, an average speed of 60 miles per hour. To the victor goes the Grand Prix Cup presented by King Farouk. Next time, let's hope a British team will be competing.

Bevin in Moscow

The Kremlin, Moscow. In the Soviet capital the Big Four Foreign Ministers meet. The most important conference since Potsdam, it will decide on peace terms for Germany. Russian Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov is the host. Off to a flying start, so far he hasn't said "No." But he has attacked almost every aspect of Anglo-American policy in Germany. Second move in the verbal battle comes from Ernest Bevin. Rejecting Molotov's proposal to drop the fusion of the German zones, Bevin had the support of Mr. George Marshall, recently appointed American Secretary of State - in Moscow for the first time. Fourth man at the meeting is France's Foreign Minister Georges Bidault. A weary and anxious world awaits the outcome. The Big Four can decide whether or not we shall have peace in our time.

Britain's Flood Peril

After Britain's coldest spell for over 50 years come the biggest road floods in living memory. Swollen by the melted snow, peaceful rivers turn into 35 miles-an-hour rapids. All over the South the floods spread. In Clapton, London, Pathe cameramen are there for the rescue of people trapped in their water-logged homes. The River Lea has done the damage here.

By rowing boat and punts, police and firemen work to evacuate marooned people.

From the rest of the country - reports flow in of more and bigger floods. From the Fens come these pictures. The situation there is described as very critical. To our reporter the Fenland people tell their story.
