

GREAT BRITAIN'S EASY WIN OVER REST OF EUROPE

At Glasgow's Hampden Park Great Britain in dark blue, kick-off against the pick of Europe's stars. Stan Matthews, No. 7, has the ball. He is still Britain's No. 1 winger. With Steffen beaten, it's only Da Rui who stops the ball at the goal mouth.

Matthews takes a corner. It's placed perfectly, but goalie Da Rui takes it off Lawton's head, and clears it away.

Now it's Billy Steele's turn. He passes to Matthews. Blackpool's new winger has a shot at goal, but Da Rui is ready.

Steele passes to Mannion and a first time goal to Britain.

A 154,000 crowd were there to watch what they thought would be the match of the century. They paid £51,000 to watch eleven British soccer players give the continental team, drawn from eight nations, a lesson in our national game. But it wasn't the football they played that lost Europe the game. Watch Gunnar Nordahl score a beautiful goal.

Britain is away again. Matthews passes to Mannion, but Ludl thinks he is the goalie and handles the ball. It's a penalty and Middlesbrough's Mannion makes it 2-1.

Steele has the ball again. A 30 yard drive and it's the goal of the match.

And yet another. Lawton makes sure of Mannion's kick at goal.

Second half and the score 4-1. Europe are still full of fight, but Britain is way on top. Billy Liddell, Scotland's left winger, pulled a muscle, but he can still shoot at the goal. Da Rui drops the ball - Lawton tries a header but the goalie scrambles it away.

Watch Tommy Lawton beat Eire's John Carey for the ball. It goes to Steele, Scotland's £15,000 forward, but Europe clear.

A text book goal by Tommy Lawton from Matthews' centre makes the final score 6-1 in Britain's favour. British soccer is still the world's best.
