The Knights of St. John return to Scotland. At Edinburgh's Holyroodhouse, members of Britain's oldest order of chivalry meet for its reconstitution in Scotland after an absence of nearly 400 years. The Grand Prior of the Order (The Duke of Gloucester) walks in procession with the Earl of Lindsay to the Palace.

From Holyroodhouse, the procession moves off to the preceptory. Here the Grand Prior and the Scottish order take over the priory. Founded soon after the 1st Crusade, the Knights of St. John were banned in Scotland by Mary Queen of Scots.

In the uniform of a Colonel of the Gordon Highlanders, the Duke bids farewell to the Knights of the Scottish order.
