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## ANGLO-U.S. PLAN ALDS PRODUCTION

Spetlight on industry. In London, members of the Angle-American Productivity Council get together before a nation-wide tour of British industries. With its aim - to increase production on the American pattern - the Council hears Sir Frederick Bain, F.B.I. Chairman.

Eleven major industries are under clear-quarters scrutiny. Staffordshire potteries exemplify the craftsmanship on which the name and prestige of British manufacture is based. The Council hopes that output will benefit by the union of this traditional skill with American mass-production methods.
