North Sea, putting acres of the Hastern Counties under water. At
Smettisham, Merfelk, Army Ducks and transports are out rescuing villagers

along the coast are closed to traffic. Loss of life - mil: inconveience plenty.

At Shegmess, summer sum-trap, there's worse to come. A blissard follows up damage to the sea-front inflicted by shattering gales and high seas. After a mild start, the weather man's certainly making up for lest time.

Huns tanten reports the same stery. Damage to the promonade alone is reckened at £50,000.

Over to Heacham, where chalets blown into matchwood testify to the fury of the winds.

In London, at Millbank, the Thames tops its highest level for years as water seeps through the Embankment. A 24-hour guard if placed on the danger spots as nearby business premises, under inches of water, are evacuated. After days of alert, the crisis passes. And none too soon.
