## H.N.S. IMPLACABLE LEADS WESTERN UNION FIRET

The fleets of four nations combine to put Western Union to the test. Ploughing through a stormy Atlantic, the greatest assembly of warships since the battle of Jutland steams to the Bay of Biscey, there to join in Exercise "Verity," the first-ever peace-time inter-nation manoeuvres. British, French, Dutch and Belgian efficers plan a common strategy for the first action an attack by a pack of submarines on the main force of the floct.

On board the cerrier Arreamones, French pilets are briefed for their part in the exercise. Overall command is in H.M.S. INFLACABLE, the Home Fleet's new flagship, from where Admiral McGriger, with Monty as an official observer, directs the operations. It is a significent change in neval tactics that an aircreft cerrier, rather than a battleship, is now the key ship within a fleet. Observers from the Atlantic Past mations look on with interest as the battle begins in earnest and a gigantic air unbrolla prepares to take off to guard the main force against land-based and cerrier-born air attacks.

Meanwhile, in the engine room, Monty - always with an eye for detail - looks around.

The main object of the manoeuvres - the testing of communications was, in the words of the official communique, "successfully carried out." That language was no barrier is further evidence that the joint Western Union fleet, criticized by dichards as impracticable, is indeed most effective and may yet lead to something far bigger - an amalgemention of Western Union's fighting zervices. As Sir Rederick McGriger steps into his modern bosum's chair to comfor with Rear Admiral

As the Admiral's helicopter lands on the carrier's deck, the commanders of the four navies meet to discuss changes in naval strategy.
