London

At St. Paul's Cathedral Mr. and Mrs. Churchill honour an old friend - the late Admiral Lord Keyes. There too, is Lady Keyes, and with her are the veterans of Zeebrugge, where Roger Keyes earned undying glery 32 years ago. Representatives of the British and U.S. Navies pay tribute to a great leader of men in two world wars. Keyes will be remembered not only for Zeebrugge, but also for his command of that daring young band - the Commandos.
