IA NOTA REPAIRS MIDDLE-WEIGHT TITLE

Challenger Tiberie Mitri of Italy jumps into the ring in Madison Square Garden to fight champion Jake La Motta of New York for the world's middleweight crown. Peacefully watching are the fighters' wives as the match starts with LaMotta, in black trunks and Mitri in white, sparring for an opening.

Governor Dewey, sees Lamotta - bull of the Bronx - clewn like Max Beer when he invites Mitri to come in and fight.

By the seventh round, both have warmed up. It's the champion's first defence of his title since he won it from the late Marcel Cerdan of France.

But Mitri is feeling the pase. Round eight is the turning point, with LeMotta moving in to press home the attack. It's the evening of Mitri's birthday, and the champion makes sure his own personal presents don't go astray. Neither boxer wastes energy on unnecessary feetwork.

In the fifteenth and last round, it's one good swap for another, with Mitri taking severe punishment. Outpointed, he can only win by a knockout. And — there's the bell. The fight's over. Mitri, unbeaten in fifty-two bouts, goes down to his first defeat. Jake LaMotta retains the middleweight championship of the world.
