LAND, SEA, AIR AGAINST REDS

Meanwhile, at Taegu 3,300 paratroopers march to their planes as the United Nations army prepares to trap 60,000 Reds ... the only large force left in South Korea. The drop zone, Munsan, 12 miles below the Parallel, has already been softened up by air attack. Flying with the mission our cameraman captures remarkable pictures of the second and biggest airborne attack of the Korean war.

The operation traps only 29,000 of the enemy; but after it General MacArthur is able to declare that South Korea is substantially cleared of organized Communist forces.
