THE QUEEN'S BIRTHDAY

To the Grand Quadrangle of Windsor Castle comes the Queen, to inspect the Grenadier Guards on her birthday. Ten years ago she was appointed their colonel, in place of the Duke of Commanght. Princess Anne is now with the Duke of Cornwall as the Queen goes to the dais to address the parade.

This parade originates in an event which is very near to us all, whereby, on the death of the King my father, it falls to me, a sovereign, to assume the Coloneley-in-Chief of all five regiments comprising the brigade of Guards. I know that I cannot do better than to follow in his footsteps, for nobody was more proud of his feet-guards than the King. And I am proud indeed to become Colonel-in-Chief of this great fraternity.

The Duke of Cornwall waves to his mother. And so Her Majesty's first ceremonial occasion comes to an end and another great function is recorded in the long history of the Royal Castle at Windsor.
