## BURN & BUTTER ARRIVE

Mr. Eden and Mr. Butler, accompanied by their wives, arrive in Washington for talks with their opposite numbers in the new Eisenhower cabinet. Later, in the office of Mr. John Foster Bulles (America's Secretary of State) proposals suggested during the Commonwealth Economic Conference in London last December, are put forward by Mr. Eden. He and Mr. Butler stress that Britain mants Trade - not Aid from America.

Mr. Eden then calls on President Eisenhower at the White House to invite America's co-operation in a wider expansion of world trade.

a trade mission. He's welcomed by United States Secretary of State

John Foster Dulies. Prime purpose of the mission, whose

is to discuss the economic and political problems besetting

the non-Communist world. Mr Bulles hears the British delegation

says they want "trade, not aid." The series of discussions will

explore more liberal trade, tarriff and payment policies to

futher the @ economic welfare of the free world.
