THE DUKE WITH THE AUSSIES

The Aussies open their tour in Britain with a match at the East Molesey Cricket Ground in Surrey. The home team bat first before a record crowd of ten thousand.

The Duke of Edinburgh, a more-than-useful oricketer himself, arrives in time to see Ray Lindwall, the Aussies' No. 1 speed merchant, take Bernard Constable's wicket with a catch to Bill Johnton.

Lindwall to MoGuire, who hooks it for a near boundary.

Here's big Bill Johnston, the fast spin bowler.

But Johnsten injures his right leg and leaves the field. He'll miss the Aussies' first county match. Now Keith Miller (not bowling bumpers on this eccasion) gives Douglas Insole an anxious moment.

Mr. David Ecoles sees wicket keeper Tallon stump MeHeill, East Molesey's captain - and down go the oppesition's hopes. During the tea interval, Lindsay Hasset introduces the Duke to the members of his team, who have been given 244 to beat by the East Molesey team. Among the other personalities present is Sir David Maxwell Pyfe. When the Aussies go into bat, Arthur Morris leads an assault on Tagg's Island, onto which no cricket ball has ever been hit.

Keith Miller lashes out, but not even the Aussies can reach the Island. Australian-bern George Tribe scatters Neil Harvey's wicket - but the tourists bat on to final victory.

At Lord's Gricket Ground, a new gallery has been built as a memorial to cricketers who gave their lives during two world wars. Paintings from many Commonwealth countries and pertraits of some giants of the past decorate the walls. The Duke of Edinburgh steps forward to declare the gallery open, and the Australian tourists appland as a memorial plaque is revealed.

A full display of the counties own emblems are among the exhibits now on show to the public - and historic bats recall bygone summer days when they were wielded by cricket idels who, to most of us, are but hallowed names in the pages of Wisden.

The Duke shows a keen interest in the relics on display, particularly in the original "Ashes," the legendary prize of the oricheting season.
