## KENTA REPORT

This is part of the Kikuyu Reserve, the chief trouble centre in Kenya, where for many months the Mau Mau have held leyal Africans in a grip of terror. To Fort Hall (a lenely cutpost in the heart of the Reserve) comes Major-General Hinde, the Director of Operations against the terrorists, to inspect the men whose job it is to track down the murderers and bring them to justice.

Kikuyu hutments have been taken over as Command Posts, and in one of these Major-General Hinde checks up his campaign tactics with local officers. These outposts are in perpetual danger from the Man Man who crosp in from the countryside to attack the loyal villagers.

General Hinde surveys the vast area where terrorists are known to be in hiding, while everhead an aircraft keeps up the search. In the rough forest land below the Mau Mau wait until nightfall.

Kikuyu Home Guard, who are deing magnificent work, greet the General as he continues his tour. The fact that the Mau Mau draws many members from the Kikuyu itself, tends to thrust into the background the firm leyalty of the vast majority of these men. At Ichichi, deep in the danger area, they build stockades against the terrerists who have vewed to kill all who assist the white min. In talks with leading tribesmen, through an interpreter, General Hinde pays tribute to their efforts to cleanse their country from the evil.

The Kiknyu, with the full support of British forces, are now using methods proved successful in Malaya.

Meanwhile, the situation is still grave and the Secretary of State for the Colemies, Mr. Oliver Lyttelton, flies in to Nairobi. Sir Evelyn Baring, the Governor, and Nairobi's Mayor wait to greet him.

Mr. Lyttelten will spend a week in Kenya discussing the emergency with the men at the top to prepare a report on the Mau Mau fer submission to Her Majesty's Government.
