Now the royal couple drive along the ranks of the life-cavers. While this inspection is held, the climax of the display will be presented. Battling with the surf, the teamswill take part in races in their surf boats and will show their skill at surf-riding - one of the main sports at Bondi.

While the display goes on, the royal couple return to the dais and watch this thrilling spectacle.
