- FRANCE AT WAR.

This is Indo-China today. No longer is the fighting there a more skirmish with terrorists - it is war. Prench paratroops drop into Dien Bien Phu, the very centre of the conflict. The situation at this fertress-comp clearly indicates how the pattern of the fighting has changed. American 'planes, guns and amumition are helping the French and Viet Nam forces: Russian and Chinese weapons are aiding the Vit Minh. Thus the clash is between Bast and West, and the prise is no longer just Indo-China, but all South East Asia.

In Bien Bien Phu, the biggest battle of the war is on; Four of the Communist's seven regular divisions hammer the French defenders day and night. Colonel de Castries, the French Garrison Commander, has ordered his men to die rather than retreat.

Heavy lesses in Endo-China are having their repercussions in France, adding to other factors which threaten the Government. Eundreds of veterans of the Indo-China campaign hold a memorial service of their dead comrades at the Unknown Soldier's Tomb under the Arc de Tricuphe. The recent dismissal of Marshal Juin who attacked the European Defence Community has caused much criticism by ex-servicemen of Prime Minister Laniel and Defence Minister Pleven.

While the ceremny continues in Paris, at the village of Annevault in Hermandy Marshal Juin attends his brother-in-less's funeral. The Marshal, who is an outspoken opponent of German rearmanent, recently made a controversial public speech without permission. Ultimately, this led to his dismissal from his French military posts. Following the service in Paris, hundreds of Jium's sympathisers stage a violent demonstration against the Premier and his follow-ministers. Shouting "Vivi Jium", the mob punch and kick Monsieur Pleven as he struggles to his car.

Most French people, if not so vehement as the rioters, are against the dismissal of Marshal Jium, one of the country's most esteemed figures. This, plus a growing anger at the losses in the Indo-China war, may seriously weaken the Government's chances of survival.
